



Exploring Specialty Credentials: Enhancing Public Health, Safety and Welfare Beyond Licensure

Background

- In 2023 CLARB contracted with Professional Testing to conduct a Feasibility Study
- The purpose of the feasibility study was to:
 - outline various types of credentials for a group of Subject Matter Experts (practicing Landscape Architects)
 - identify gaps in Landscape Architecture content and/or topics not currently addressed by CLARB and/or the industry
 - select topics and content areas in which CLARB may be interested in developing further credentials
 - survey the profession to see if there is buy-in or desire for additional credentials

Workshop Results

- Five areas were initially identified:
 - Climate Change and Biodiversity
 - Social and Cultural Awareness
 - Design Specialists in Specific Areas
 - Advanced Technology
 - Professional Practice
- Through discussions, we identified two top areas:
 - Climate Change and Biodiversity
 - Social and Cultural Awareness

Climate Change & Biodiversity

- Mitigation reducing embodied and operational emissions and increasing carbon sequestration
 - Life-cycle assessments evaluating materials, carbon calculations, assessing environmental impacts
- Adaptation responses to address river and coastal flooding, fire, drought, extreme heat, extreme environmental changes, disaster response, evacuation route equity, etc. (FEMA regulations, creative solutions for resolutions and mitigation)
- Biodiversity Loss and Migrations species loss
 - Performance metrics to evaluate biodiversity (e.g., conservation, preservation, resilience)
- Resiliency proactive and predictive, including actions like water modeling
- Social Equity social/cultural awareness is further down on this list, but may also want to be included here, evacuation route equity

Social and Cultural Awareness

- Community Engagement social environmental equity, part of solution, part of process, facilitation practices, communication approaches
- Legal Considerations land owners vs land users vs land renters
- **Legible Landscapes** reading the landscape based on context clues, designing with the integration of surrounding cultures or communities, (e.g., ability to design so that people move through a space the way it is intended without overt signage and wayfinding)
- Cultural Heritage understanding the different strategies between restoration, rehabilitation, and preservation, ability to adapt spaces for current use (e.g., making historic sites accessible)
- Indigenous Knowledge Systems approaches for interacting with nature and ecological systems, understanding the health of climate change, awareness of consequences of climate change
- Indigenous Consultation how to interact with certain populations
- Natural Heritage understanding the current and future states of a living system, understanding the different strategies between restoration, rehabilitation, and preservation as it relates to ecological systems

Climate Resilient Design & Biodiversity

Findings

- Interest in CLARB setting a standard on Climate Change and Biodiversity to increase the quality of landscape architecture
- Limited interest in obtaining a credential
- Career advancement, marketability, or other financial incentives for earning a credential are not high
- Interest higher if employer paid, however, results indicated employers are not interested in funding

Social, Cultural, & Indigenous Awareness

Findings

- There is little support for a future credential about this topic
- A total of 25% of employees working in the public sector have zero support for a future credential about this topic, and more than 50% of those working in the public sector have 50% or less support for a future credential about this topic

Overall Findings:

- Survey results suggest there is not overwhelming support to develop either of these future credentials
- However, there does seem to be interest in CLARB developing training programs, certificate programs, or standard or industry guidelines specifically around Climate Change & Biodiversity





The Council of Landscape Architectural Registration Boards (CLARB) works to protect the public's health, safety and welfare by establishing and promoting professional licensure standards. Our members are the licensure boards across the United States and Canada.

We prepare, administer and score the Landscape Architect Registration Examination (L.A.R.E.) which assesses the ability of prospective licensees to protect the public's health, safety and welfare.

We also manage a professional information system called the CLARB Council Record (start your Record here), through which landscape architects document and verify their education, experience, examination and licensure history. The Record helps reduce barriers to mobility by streamlining the initial and reciprocal licensure processes.




